While in the Western hemisphere different databases were separately developed for moveable heritage (paintings, antiques, etc.), immoveable heritage (monuments, historic buildings, archeological sites) and intangible heritage (oral history, music, dance), with no interconnection provided, the African culture and perspective inspired our Foundation to adapt its system to this broader insight and visionary future use.

Considering that tangible heritage is the physical manifestation of intangible heritage, the connected classes or links between the tangible and intangible 'components' of cultural heritage will make the database a most efficient and complete model for research and scholarship.

CulturalHeritage.cc was founded in 1999 with the mission to create an affordable software product and online community for museum professionals. CulturalHeritage.cc Foundations is a leading provider of collection management software to cultural heritage organizations around the world.

The CulturalHeritage.cc website serves as an international portal and curators platform within the museum environment.

The key application – MuseumD-System, built on the frequently awarded CrossmarX ‘STUDIO’ software – allows flexible adaptation to workflows such as application processes fit to national or local laws and procedures.

The General Public has access to the international Museums index, exhibition agenda and several collections uploaded by CulturalHeritage.cc participants.

Partners of the CulturalHeritage.cc Foundation have full access to the database and are authorized to upload relevant information, museums event agenda, documentation, collections and objects or items of all types.

The international - cross-bordering - projects database is also available to all partners.

Already for 10 years MuseumD-System is the world’s most affordable museum software on the present market. Since 2006 our database includes enhanced multimedia and new screens for cataloguing all types of collections such as Archaeology, Maritime Archaeology, Egyptology, Oral history and more.

MuseumD-System was the first museum software that supported all types of documents, including Audio and Video and 3D imaging. CulturalHeritage.cc offered its system for free to all AFRICOM members in 2003 to support the documentation of – in particular - African Intangible Heritage.

MuseumD-System provides easy connectivity between all types of Tangible and Intangible Heritage

resulting in contextual information of the uploaded collection records.

CulturalHeritage.cc Foundation's Multimedia options – video, audio and other digital instruments such as Adobe Presenter, Flash etc. - help you enhance your catalogue records by attaching video clips, audio files, digital images, MS-Word documents, Excel spreadsheets, and web pages.

The collective database can easily be implemented into existing websites at lowest possible costs.

Thanks to contributions of our partners and close correspondence with museum standards such as Getty Object ID, Spectrum, CHIN and Dublin Core, CulturalHeritage.cc Foundation sets its standard for collection management. It is affordable, flexible, and easy to use for both small organizations and large collections with an infinite amount of catalogue records.

Dissemination of Cultural Heritage

Cataloguing by digitization to disseminate 'Tangible and Intangible Cultural Heritage' is the main objective of our Foundation. In particular our support to developing countries, museums and cultural heritage institutions with low (or no) budgets are our stakeholders and partners. We work in close cooperation with our stakeholders in both development, testing and daily use of our web oriented contextual database. Input of knowledge by our partners is – in this way – shared with all users at lowest possible costs.

From Old to New

Conversions of data from old systems to our database - built on the latest industry standards - is a smooth process and makes the use of old systems superfluous.

The repeatedly awarded CrossmarX Software 'Engine' - eluding expensive software design - enables our partners with the proper inventorying and documentation as encouraged by ICOM.

Digital information presented in our database is

- easy to find and easy to retrieve, also cross-sectorial

MuseumD-System: our web based Collection Management System

-Our system is built on the latest industry web standards and easily competes with the old fashioned internally oriented systems since most were developed in the pre-internet era.

-The underlying software, developed by CrossmarX the Netherlands, proved to be the most flexible compared to other systems available in the present market; quick changes in the database model and adaptations to the requested needs of its users proved this point on many occasions.

-Our system competes with existing software packages, even 'open source', in terms of costs, both in development and maintenance costs.

-Conversion from old systems, based on old fashioned rigid software proved to be easy and fast to accomplish.

-Based on the web version a stand alone version is available for internal or 'field' use. Data are easy to synchronize with the web version.

Conclusion: Dissemination of our Cultural Heritage

CulturalHeritage.cc Foundation as non-profit organization proved, during the 10 years since it was founded, to be valuable and effective for the dissemination of Cultural Heritage of all kinds. Also, its database model and collection type formats developed in concert with its users demonstrated a most effective and efficient way to build a world museum standard without ignoring the existing available standards.

> 2000: Mobility of objects

As of January 2000, a database model has been developed for moveable objects in cooperation with The Dutch Institute for Cultural Heritage (ICN). The goal was to build a digital platform to publish objects in storage and thus to enable research, mobility of objects (e.g. loan, exchange, de-accessioning) and virtual access to objects that might otherwise never be displayed.

> 2003: Intangible heritage

A call made by AFRICOM for documenting intangible heritage, before the AFRICOM conference in 2003, made clear that the database developed by our Foundation could respond to that need, as it already allowed not only uploading digital images, but also storage of sound, video and all other types of standard documents (PDF, PPT, Word, Excel, etc). At the time, no other collection management systems with these features were available.

RE: ObjectID and MuseumDepot Foundation

ObjectID (© the J. Paul Getty Trust), is an international standard for describing cultural objects, and was developed through collaboration with the international museum community, police and customs agencies, the art trade, insurance industry and valuers of art and antiquities.

The Getty Trust has granted the International Council of Museums (ICOM) a worldwide license to house ObjectID and to undertake promotional activities for it. UNESCO and ICOM are currently working on translations of the ObjectID checklist into as many languages as possible. Some of these translations are being done in close cooperation with the MuseumDepot.org Foundation of the Netherlands.

MuseumDepot.org has developed a stand-alone application database based on the ObjectID standard checklist that will be distributed free of charge to all ICOM and AFRICOM members.

It has become apparent that the ObjectID standard checklist requires translating not just into European languages, but also into Swahili, and possibly other languages used on the African continent.

AFRICOM supports the goal of the MuseumDepot.org Foundation to undertake translations of the ObjectID standard checklist into as many African languages as possible, which will go a long way in assisting the fight against illicit traffic on the African continent.

AFRICOM is a relatively new organisation, with limited funding, but with a large membership base and a large constituency. AFRICOM therefore encourages other partners of cultural heritage to support the project in any way possible, as it will no doubt be instrumental in curbing the menace of illicit traffic that plagues this continent.

I do hope that your Institute may be of assistance to MuseumDepot in identifying how a Swahili translation may be achieved for the very valuable ObjectID standard checklist. I do hope that we can count on your support and assistance.

Door onze kunstredactie

ROTTERDAM, 13 MEI. Tweehonderd zestig Afrikaanse erfgoedinstellingen hebben deze week een cd-rom ontvangen waarmee zij hun collecties digitaal in kaart kunnen brengen.

De computersoftware is ontwikkeld door de Nederlandse stichting MuseumDepot.org en geschonken aan musca, bibliotheken en universiteiten in landen als Kameroen, Kenia, Zambia en Nigeria.

Het initiatief kwam van de grond na een oproep van de African Council of Museums (AFRICOM). Volgens Floris Guntenaar, medeoprichter van MuseumDepot, was er in Afrika dringend behoefte aan een systeem voor registratie van het niet-tastbare erfgoed. „Oftewel alles wat niet in een depot past. Denk aan verhalen, dansen en muziekuitingen. Uniek aan

dit programma is dat behalve beelden ook audio- en videobeelden kunnen worden opgenomen.” Op deze manier kan voorkomen worden dat dit materiaal verloren gaat. Daarnaast is digitalisering van erfgoed een goed middel tegen ongeoorloofde handel.

Het zogenaamde MuseumD-System is een al

bestaand programma voor digitale objectregistratie dat de afgelopen jaren door MuseumDepot werd ontwikkeld in samenwerking met het Instituut Collectie Nederland (ICN). „Normaal gesproken betalen musca rond de tienduizend euro voor dergelijke software”, zegt Guntenaar. „De Afrikaanse musca betalen 150 euro.” Voor de productiekosten van de cd-rom is een bijdrage gevraagd aan het ministerie van OCenW.

In juni zal een team van instructeurs afreizen naar Dakar om ruim driehonderd medewerkers van zo'n tweehonderd instellingen vertrouwd te maken met het MuseumD-System. Ook heeft Stichting MuseumDepot.org plannen om het verspreidingsgebied van de software uit te breiden naar Azië en Zuid-Amerika.

Dear Mr Guntenaar,

I am writing to you in my capacity as Chairperson of the Museums Association of Namibia to request your assistance in providing a workshop on use of the Museum-D software for computerized cataloguing. The Museums Association of Namibia is responsible for the regional development of museums in Namibia. As you are aware the Museum-D cd-rom is being provided to twelve different museums in Namibia, but we would like to request the assistance of two facilitators to train the curators in the use of the new software.

We would like to propose that a workshop could be held in Windhoek, the capital city of Windhoek. The Museums Association of Namibia is currently negotiating with the University of Namibia for the use of their computer facilities for the workshop. We would be able to sponsor the accommodation of participants from Namibian museums and cover the cost of their travel to Windhoek. Unfortunately our financial resources are very limited and we would need assistance to help with the cost of bringing the two facilitators from Holland to Namibia.

We anticipate that the workshop would involve ten to fifteen participants. We can organize the workshop at your convenience (although we would require at least a couple of months notice in order to inform participants). We will be holding our AGM in Walvis Bay on 26th-27th May and will be arranging transport for people to travel there from Windhoek on Thursday, 25th May. If the training workshop could be arranged for the period Monday, 22nd May to Wednesday, 24th May participants would then be able to travel on to the AGM (which you would also be welcome to attend). However, if these dates are inconvenient for you, perhaps you could let us know which dates would best suit you.

We look forward to welcoming you to Namibia and our small, but growing, museum sector.

General

Object ID is an international standard for describing cultural objects. It has been developed through the collaboration of the museum community, police and customs agencies, the art trade, insurance industry, and valuers of art and antiques.

The Object ID project was initiated by the J. Paul Getty Trust in 1993 and the standard was launched in 1997. It is being promoted by major law enforcement agencies, including the FBI, Scotland Yard and Interpol; museum, cultural heritage, art trade and art appraisal organizations; and insurance companies.

By means of its descriptive standard, Object ID contributes towards the fight against art theft by allowing easy documentation of objects and their quick identification in case of illicit appropriation.

The project

The Object ID project began with two premises: one, a stolen object cannot be returned to its rightful owner unless it has been adequately documented; and two, in the case of theft, the information about the object

should be able to travel rapidly across the world and be circulated among a number of organizations. Both premises require agreement on what information constitutes an adequate record for identifying an object.

Present situation

The Getty Trust has granted the International Council of Museums (ICOM) a worldwide license to house Object ID and to undertake promotional activities for the standard. The Getty retains copyright. Thus, when publishing the Checklist, the copyright owner has to be mentioned: "© The J. Paul Getty Trust" as well as the ICOM Web site housing Object ID: <http://icom.museum/object-id/>

Communication

UNESCO and ICOM are presently working on translations of the Object ID checklist - with the support and cooperation of its international members - into as many languages as possible.

Communication between all responsible parties supporting the Object ID project is essential. Part of these translations are executed in close cooperation with

CulturalHeritage.cc Foundation (prev. MuseumDepot.org Foundation), The Netherlands.

CulturalHeritage.cc Foundation developed a stand-alone application database based on the Object ID standard checklist that is being offered for free to all ICOM members.

Development

CulturalHeritage.cc presently develops an online database that enables participating members to work simultaneously on the translations necessary.

The International Council of Museums supports its goal to establish an international network of Object ID users with the aim to fight illicit traffic in the most efficient way. It therefore encourages the initiatives of CulturalHeritage.cc to undertake translations of the Object ID standard in as many languages as possible. Taken into account that ICOM is a large organization but with limited funding it asks interested and responsible parties to support this important project where possible.

OBJECT ID CHECKLIST

▶ **TAKE PHOTOGRAPHS**
Photographs are of vital importance in identifying and recording stolen objects. In addition to overall views, take close-ups of inscriptions, markings, and any damage or repairs. If possible, include a scale or object of known size in the image.

▶ **ANSWER THESE QUESTIONS:**

Type of Object
What kind of object is it (e.g. painting, sculpture, clock, watch)?

Materials & Techniques
What materials is the object made of (e.g. brass, wood, oil on canvas)? Has any repair work been done (e.g. carved, cast, restored)?

Measurements
What is the size and/or weight of the object? Specify which unit of measurement is being used (e.g. cm, in) and to which dimension the measurement refers (e.g. length, width, depth).

Inscriptions & Markings
Are there any identifying markings, numbers, or inscriptions on the object (e.g., a signature, collection, title, maker's mark, party made, property mark)?

Distinguishing Features
Does the object have any physical characteristics that could help to identify it (e.g., damage, repairs, or manufacturing defects)?

Title
Does the object have a title by which it is known and might be described (e.g., 'The Street')?

Subject
What is the main or expressed (e.g. landscape, battle, woman holding child)?

Date or Period
When was the object made (e.g., 18th century, 17th century, Late Roman Age)?

Maker
Do you know who made the object? This may be the name of a known individual (e.g., Thomas Gainsborough), a company (e.g., Tiffany), or a well-known group (e.g., Impressionist).

▶ **WRITE A SHORT DESCRIPTION**
This can also include any additional information which helps to identify the object (e.g., color and shape of the object, where it was found).

▶ **KEEP IT SECURE**
Having documented the object, keep this information in a secure place.

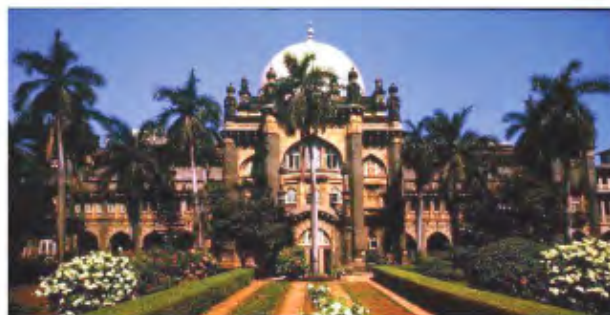

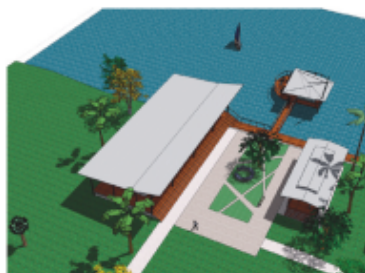

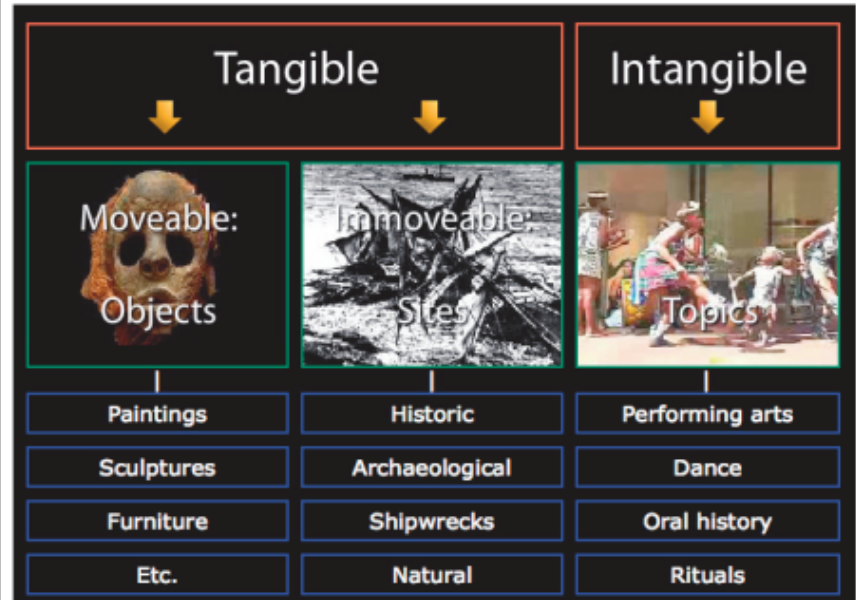
Exchange of academic research, knowledge and experience in the field of international cultural heritage is brought together and functions as a communication platform for its participants.

> 2008: Development and Policy

Terms of References (TOR) as developed by SAHRA were further specified and implemented in the collective database model. After 8 years of modeling, development and testing, the present database model comes close to the envisioned perspective of our foundation: to provide a complete contextual model that serves documentation of all types of cultural heritage to heritage institutions at lowest possible costs; offline as well as online; with possible synchronization of the offline version with the online version. It concomitantly functions as an international research and communication platform.



Based on the SAHRA Terms of References and MuseumD-System a pilot model was presented at SAHRA's offices in Cape Town, March 2009.



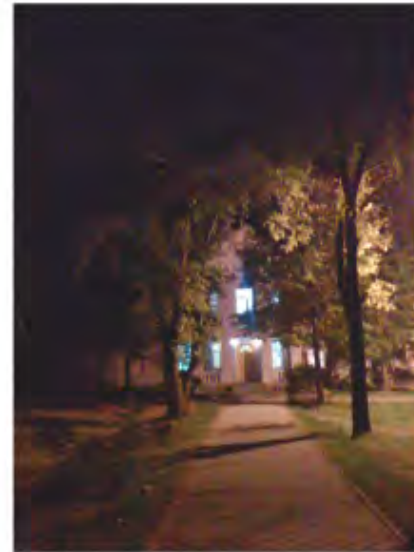

Following training and survey of the translation executed in March 2009 in concert with the RMA, the first 'Training for Trainees' took place at the Lev Tolstoy estate, Yasnaya Polyana, September 2009

The program proved suitable for digitization of the Russian collections in the Russian language and does not require the purchase of any additional software.

To provide sustainability, adaptation to specific sub-collection formats can be implemented by the RMA within its own environment, ownership and responsibility. Local data storage and private access to the award winning CrossmarX 'Application Engine' guarantees long-term ownership and enables RMA to apply proper specifications within its own environment.

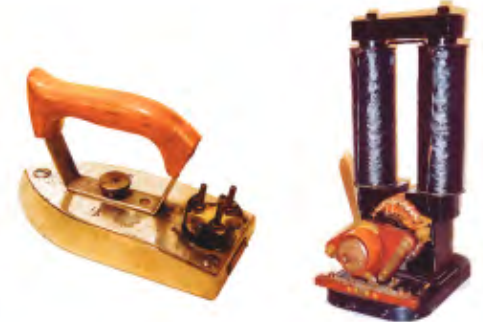

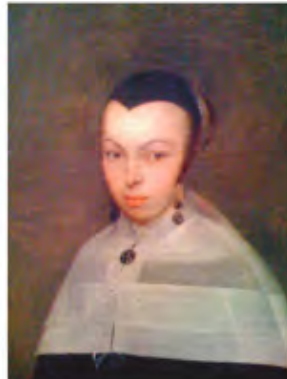

(...) The computer program that the CHF has developed to digitize museum collections is suitable for registration and digitization of all kinds of museum collections in Russia.

From September 7th till the 14th 2007 two representatives of the RMA, Mr. E. Surin and Mrs. M. Zvereva, to learn from the experience of Dutch colleagues in the field of digitally describing works of art in museum collections.

During their stay they got to know the databases in the following Dutch institutions:

- RKD in The Hague: the Ad-lib program developed originally to set up registration in libraries and adapted for description of works of art.

- ICN: inventory system Musip

-SCI: MuseumD-System, developed by CulturalHeritage.cc for entering data of museum collections.

This last program, complying to all the requirements of ICOM, is suitable for digitization of the Russian collections in the Russian language and does not require the purchase of any additional computer software. Entries can be executed by any curator connected to the internet. In addition costs involved for the use of this program are low.

(...)

Long term results of the project:

1. The correct information makes thorough publication of the collections possible.
2. Museums can publish their own collection catalogues or can add to existing publications.
3. Exchange of collections on loan nationally as well as internationally is made easier.
4. International exhibitions can be organized.
5. Art theft, illegal transportation of art objects and illegal dealing in art will be prevented.
6. We hope that this project will contribute to a far wider repute of the work of our non-profit organisation.

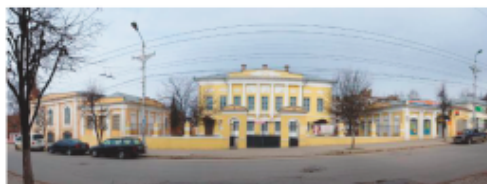


